A HEALTHY CONGREGATION

The following is a lengthy quote, but, please read it carefully and reflect upon it. It comes from a book I read in July: "Built on the Rock, the Healthy Congregation", by Ted Kober. The quote: "Why should people make time for Bible study a priority? Luther explains the commandment 'Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy,' by saying, 'We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it.' Prioritizing many other activities, especially leisure, over the study of God's Word is sin. I became aware of how much our Western society values leisure over

God's Word when I first visited India. Christians in India often sacrifice basic needs to make time for God. Many take an entire Sunday just to attend worship. Most walk to church because they don't own cars. It may take one, two, or three hours to walk one way. The average worship service lasts several hours. I was told that if a sermon lasted fewer than forty-five minutes, people were offended...I felt ashamed for my culture. Americans are among the wealthiest people in the world. Yet, we find it difficult to spend much more than one hour a week in worship...Many believe that attending worship two times a month is regular worship." As I said at the beginning of this paragraph, much to reflect upon.

ON A PERSONAL NOTE

My daughter Anne and granddaughter Elsa arrived here on Saturday, July 21st. Elsa, a junior at the University of South Carolina, made a presentation in my Adult Bible Class about her recent trip to Africa with a medical team. On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday we made a fast trip to Nebraska, Iowa and Minnesota to visit family and loved ones. The Compton's returned to South Carolina on Thursday. Another family member is heading South. Grandson Tyler Arends will be inducted as Vicar at Our Savior Lutheran Church in Huntsville, Alabama.

When you get up on Sunday morning, please remember your Lord Jesus...how He lived for you, died for you, arose for you. Then say "yes" to Him through your worship, hearing His Word, fellowshipping with fellow believers. Darkness says "no" to Him. The world says "no" to Him. The devil says "no" to Him. A WORD FROM THE PAST

Friedrich Pfotenhauer was president of the LCMS from 1911 to 1935. In 1897, on the 50th anniversary of the Synod, he was president of the Minnesota and Dakota District. He said the following to the gathered district presidents and laypeople:

"Finally, we have cause to celebrate our synodical jubilee with fear and trembling when we glace at the present condition of our Synod. It is true, we still have the very precious treasure, the pure Word of God. As a rule, it still governs our congregations, but it cannot be denied that we are no longer what our fathers were. Indeed, the symptoms of the decline are evident and increasing among us. I will only point out a few. The holy zeal to study and grow in God's Word has declined markedly among both preachers and hearers.

The boundary between us and the world is no longer drawn so sharply. Our manner of life is not always prudent. Terrible scandals, also on the part of our pastors, are on the increase. While we are richer in earthly things than our fathers, we are weaker in faith and Christian love."

Wow! If Pfotenhauer felt that way about his generation, I dare say his words are an indictment exponentially greater upon ours.



HEALTH TOPIC FOR AUGUST 2018

Too Hot? Find Some Shade!

Many of the faith lessons in the Bible take place in the Middle East desert. God let His people into areas where they had to trust Him to provide for all their needs. How often does God do the same for us? He allows the challenges of illness or injury to enter our



lives. He leads us into "desert places" where we become exhausted, hot and just tired of the struggle. But God also provides "shade" for us – places for us to "cool off". As we in the northern hemisphere enter the summer months, this imagery reminded me of the serious condition of heat exhaustion.

Heat exhaustion and heat-related illnesses occur when the body can't keep itself cool. As the temperature rises, the body cools itself through sweat evaporation. On hot, humid days the evaporation of sweat is slowed by the increased moisture in the air. When sweating isn't enough to cool the body, high body temperature can cause serious changes to occur, followed by dehydration and illness.

Heat exhaustion is when the body becomes too hot. The signs and symptoms are heavy sweating, feeling weak or confused, dizziness, nausea, headache, fast heartbeat, and dark-colored urine which indicates dehydration.

If one thinks he or she is experiencing heat exhaustion, getting out of the heat as quickly as possible is very important. Finding a cool, shady place is necessary if unable to get into a building that has air conditioning. Drinking plenty of water or other fluids is essential. Don't drink alcohol or caffeinated carbonated drinks such as sodas! These beverages can worsen the heat exhaustion. Removing any tight fitting or unnecessary clothing will be helpful. Taking a cool shower or bath or applying cool water to skin will be helpful, as well as applying cool cloths to the head and neck to help decrease body temperature. If a decrease in body temperature has not occurred within 30 minutes, it is very important to seek medical attention. Heat exhaustion can progress to heatstroke.

Some medications can increase the sensitivity to heat-related conditions. Groups of medications that affect how the body reacts to heat include antihistamines, beta-blockers and vasoconstrictors, diet pills, antidepressants and antipsychotics, anticonvulsants, diuretics, as well as many illegal drugs.

When one needs to be outside on a hot day, taking measures of protection such as the following are important.

Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, light-colored clothing.

Cover the head with a hat or umbrella.

Drink plenty of fluids. Some sports drinks replenish salt lost through sweating.

Avoid being out during the hottest time of the day – between 10 am and 6 pm.



Take frequent breaks and drink, even if not thirsty.

If one has medical conditions, talking with a healthcare provider about specific medications can be very helpful.
