EASTER

Thank you also to Neil Wieland (Trombone) and Cameron Fridell and Ariana Geoffroy (Trumpets) and Aiden Sinclair (flute). And, thank you to our organist Melissa Blanton, and to accompanist, Cheryl Lanter. These people spent hours and hours getting ready for the many services. Most certainly we are blessed by their talent, commitment and discipline.

WINDOW COVERINGS

Have you noticed the new coverings on the church's stained-glass windows? What a difference. We can now see from the outside that we have stained glass and from the inside they are so much brighter. Cost: around \$30,000.

GARAGE MAINTENANCE BUILDING

And, have you noticed that work has begun on the Garage/Maintenance Building? Drive by to see. It will be on

the parking lot north of the new building. On Sunday the Voters approved borrowing up to \$50,000 from the Lutheran Church Extension Fund to finish paying for this building. We already have some \$44,000 to pay on it.

The Voters also approved the purchase of the north 80 feet of Lot 1 of the block north of the new building. This is the corner of 8th and Riley where the now vacant Seventh Day Adventist Church is. Cost: \$4,500. We now own the whole half-block. It was necessary to get this lot to fill in the area north of the parking lot.

KAIR RADIO BROADCAST

We now have 52 sponsors for our 2019 KAIR Radio Broadcasts. Thank you to all who gave \$50.00 to sponsor a Sunday broadcast. We are on at 9:30 a.m. Be sure to listen if you are unable to be present here in the sanctuary for worship.

MOTHER'S DAY

On Mother's Day we recognize our High School Seniors at our 8:00 a.m. service. Please meet at 7:45 a.m. in the church basement. Please bring your cap and gown. We will process into the church.

ASCENSION DAY

May 30th, forty days after Easter, is Ascension Day. We will have worship with Holy Communion at 7:00 p.m. Please pray for this service. Plan to come and bring someone with you.

COMMUNION SUNDAYS

Once again, about leaving before Communion. This happens more at 10:30 than at 8:00 a.m. If you are invited to the table of a friend, do you get up and leave as soon as you have eaten? Will you be as polite to our Lord as you are to your friend? The service ends after the Benediction and after you have greeted all the folks around you.

And, thank you to Joyce Duitsman for planting flowers in the circle by the air conditioners.


FLOWER BEDS

As you can see above, we are AHEAD in one area of our budget and BEHIND in two. We lost some more ground in the HOME budget and are now BEHIND \$15,190.47. We also lost some ground in the MISSION budget and are now BEHIND \$2,492.86. We are AHEAD \$241.40 in the BUILDING budget. It is with money saved from the building budget that we are paying for the covering of our stained glass windows, around \$30,000. Stewardship reports are now in the narthex. If you do not have offering envelopes and wish to have some, please contact the church office.

We have made our Lutheran Hour goal. Thank you to all who gave to make this possible. Please use the other benevolence envelopes in the front of your packets so that we can make the other goals which are above.

Since Vacation Bible School will be the first week in June, we encourage you to use that envelope in May to help pay for this special ministry. So far this year in that envelope we have received \$297.00. It would be good to receive \$2,500.00 since per pupil cost of Vacation Bible School is around \$10.00.

Please note that the Building Fund and the Building and Grounds Foundation are two different things. There is a Building Fund line on our envelopes and each November we pledge (make a commitment to this. Our <u>yearly</u> budget or goal for this is \$35,000 or \$634.61 per week. This money is used for building or property debt when we have it or is saved and used for property maintenance when needed. The glass doors for school and church were paid out of this. Money saved from this fund was also used for the new church roof.

The Buildings and Grounds Foundation is an endowment fund. There is one envelope in the front of your packets for this. Money given in this envelope is invested and only the income is used. This fund has now grown large enough so that last year the dividend and interest income from it was \$17,682.16. This year, \$15,000 of this amount will go into the regular home budget to help pay off expenses connected with our properties, i.e., utilities, insurance, waste disposal, etc. The difference will be saved and used for property upkeep, i.e., this year the painting of the old school (yellow) building.

If you have questions about these funds, please ask.

Also, please pray for our Financial Picture and that as a congregation we will grow more and more as tithing people.

SCHOOL ENDOWMENT FUND

When we started this fund, we wrote: "It is our <u>DREAM</u> that Trinity Lutheran School be one of the finest schools in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, that our program of Christian and academic education be second to none, that our teachers and support people be among the best paid, and that our facilities equipment and materials be of top quality."

To fulfill this DREAM, we established the Trinity Lutheran School Endowment Fund in 1969 with a gift of \$100. All gifts received are invested and only income is used. Income received in 1970 was \$191.95. Income received in 2018 was \$160,679.98. Total income received through the years (dividend and interest) now total \$2,466,499.27. All of this has been used for Trinity School, for teacher salaries, facility education, classroom remodeling, equipment, teaching materials, program development, books, desks, technology, etc., etc.

Since the first of this year this fund has received \$23,639.80. Memorial gifts were: Wilbur Neill - \$50.00; Wayne Donaldson - \$50.00. A gift of \$95.00 was given in honor of Lois Estes. Choice Dollars of \$931.00 was given by Bob and Frances Peterson. Another couple gave a gift of \$2,300, a tithe of a special gift they had received.

Let me encourage you to remember our School Endowment Fund in your giving. The envelope is in the front of your packet. Also, please remember it with memorials and bequests. Every gift will work for years to come, every gift will bring blessings to children yet to be.

Walk Your Way to Health; Health Note for May 2019 (reprinted from Lutheran Parish Nurse International with permission, Ipni.org)

Maybe you are a bit like me – I am not into running. Or maybe you have had an injury and you can't run. So, walk! Each and every step you take is part of your journey to better health.

Research from the National Runners Health Survey and the National Walkers Health Study found that the same energy used for moderate-intensity walking and vigorous-intensity running resulted is similar reductions in the risk for high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, and possibly heart disease over the six years of the study. The more people who walked or ran each week, the more their health benefits increased.

Walking requires no special training or equipment. Good shoes are important and should feel supportive, not snug or restricting. Light weight, flexible shoes with shock-absorbent soles are ideal. No special clothing is required. Let common sense be the guide. A T-shirt and shorts in warm weather and dressing in layers for cooler times. A hat and gloves are also important tools. For safety wear brightly colored clothing and reflective strips if you walk when it is dark. For safety purposes, walk facing cars if there is no sidewalk. Beware of dogs and unfamiliar surroundings or people. When you begin walking take time to stretch and to warm up and remember to stretch when you finish. Begin modestly and set realistic goals for yourself. Incorporating walking into your daily routine helps to increase your activity. You can work-in walking when you: 1) take the dog out for a walk, 2) park farther from your workplace or shopping, 3) window shop at the mall, and 4) walk during your lunch break. If you are especially busy, you can split your walking into 10-15-minute segments.

With walking it is not all or nothing; it is step-by-step. The main thing is to walk naturally and comfortably. If you want to aim for an ideal stride, try to keep your posture erect with your chin up and your eyes forward. Keep your shoulders square, your back straight, arms close to your body and bent at the elbows. To avoid problems, back off when you are ill or injured. Staying well-hydrated is always important, but especially in hot weather. Walk indoors in bad weather at a gym, the mall, on a treadmill, or even in the hallways at work.

Maybe you have been sedentary for a while. With walking that is no problem. Even if you start with a few minutes a day, simply moving will have benefits to your heart and balance. Each day you can increase activity slowly. The American Heart Association now recommends that adults aim for a minimum of 30 minutes of physical activity per day and at least 150 minutes of moderate activity per week.

Walking has it all. It's simple and natural, very moderate to intense. You can walk alone or with others, inside or out, in the country or in the city, at home or away. You can get all the benefits of moderate exercise with a very low risk of injury. And, it is inexpensive. With all things considered, Charles Dickens got it right: "Walk to be healthy, walk to be happy."

I would like to add to the above article that there are many places to walk in Atchison. If you want to walk indoors, Memorial Hall at 819 Commercial St is open for walkers from 7 AM to 12 noon Mon-Fri. The river road walk is a nice level place to walk with benches if you need to rest. If you want a more challenging walk with some hills there are trails at Jackson Park out south 5th street. For safety avoid walking on slippery surfaces; wet floors and wet pavement can be slick!

Greetings from Trinity's 4th grade classroom!

It's hard to believe there is only one month of school left! Fourth graders have learned SO much this year.

We start each day with religion class. We have studied many important stories from the Bible, beginning with Creation. Some of this class's favorite stories were "Three Men in a Fiery Furnace," "Israel Crossing the Jordan," and "David and Goliath." We recently finished a Unit on Jesus' Last Teachings, Death, and Resurrection. Our final unit covers the Ascension and Pentecost.



We do memory work on Tuesday and Thursday. Part of their memory work this month will be reciting the Books of the Bible in order. We have listened to many songs to help us learn them.



In math we spent a good part of the year reviewing multiplication and division facts. Then they worked on larger multiplication problems and long division. They learned how to add and subtract fractions. We also had units on measurement, both customary and metric. Our final unit is about geometry. Yesterday we learned how to measure angles. Students finally got to use the protractors! They were so excited!

We had a new reading series this year. My fourth graders love animals and many of their favorite reading stories were about animals. I think their favorite story was the very first one we read: "Because of Winn Dixie". It's a great story about a dog found in a grocery store and the girl who adopts him.

At the beginning of the year, I gave the students a blank map of the United States and asked them to fill in the names of any states and capitals they knew. Many did not know any at all. A few knew where Kansas, Texas, or California was. I think one child may have known 13 states, but no capitals. Throughout the year we studied all the regions of the United States. Now most of my students can label all 50 states and capitals! We are still working on spelling them correctly, but they have come so far.

On May 3rd, we will be going to Overland Park to Deana Rose Children's Farmstead for our field trip. We will get to see many farm animals such as cows, ducks, rabbits, and sheep. We might get to feed a baby goat. They also have bison, eagles, prairie dogs, and many other animals on display. We will explore a Native American earthen home and observe lots of Native American artifacts. We will get to see a one-room school house and take a wagon ride. Students will be able to fish with a cane pole or mine for gems if they choose. Deana Rose also has a blacksmith shop, an old-time bank, a barbershop, and a general store. Students always love going to Deana Rose and these fourth graders can't wait!

It's been a great year in fourth grade!


