ABOUT CREMATION

The early Christians firmly rejected pagan Rome's cremations. Caecilius, a Roman pagan critical of Christians in about 195 A.D. angrily stated that Christians "execrate our funeral pyres and condemn cremation." In short, Christians did more than just spurn cremation for themselves.

Sometimes Christians were persecuted for condemning cremation. In AD 177, in Lyons, Gaul (modern France), Christian-hating persecutors rushed into Christian homes, brutally killed many, burned their bodies, cast their charred bones into the Rhone River, and then mockingly shouted: "Now let's see if their bodies will rise again..." (Eusebius, Ecclesiastical History 5:63).

By the mid-fourth century, Rome's cremations had mostly ended. But in some regions, pagans still clung to it. This prompted Charlemagne the Great in AD 789 to declare cremation a capital crime throughout the Holy Roman Empire. And as Christianity expanded geographically by the mid-eleventh century earth burial had replaced cremations in Denmark, Brittain, and Scandinavia. Christians opposed cremation so firmly that when pagans converted, they had to promise never to be cremated.

Then, for almost a millennium, earth burial was the only method of disposing of the dead in all Europe. Burial had also become the exclusive practice in the New World. But by the early 1800's some deists, atheists, universalists and a few Christians, motivated by the philosophy of the Enlightenment, brought cremation back to Europe, and by the latter 1800's it came to the United States.

When cremation returned in the early 1800's in some areas of Europe, Christians, unlike their earlier ancestors, were notably silent. It was not until 1886, that Pope Leo XIII issued two anti-cremation decrees that barred Catholics from "demanding cremation for one's own body or that of another." In 1892, the Holy See issued a third decree demanding that Catholics were not to cooperate in any cremation activities. In 1917, the Code of Canon Law prohibited ecclesiastical burial of bodies that were to be cremated. In 1926, Pope Pius XI condemned cremation saying its advocates were "enemies of Christianity." He also declared that cremation de-emphasized the resurrection of the body. But in 1963, Pope Pius VI made an about-face by contradicting the five previous degrees and worse, said nothing about two thousand years of Christian opposition.

The biblical concept of death as "sleep" prompted the early Christians to give Roman burial sites a new name, <u>coemeteria</u> (sleeping places), from which we get

"cemeteries" in English. The word <u>coemeteria</u> symbolized Christians awaiting the resurrection, an affront to the pagans.

We remember, too, that while the pagan nations around Israel burned their dead, God's people did not. They looked upon the body as a creation and good gift of God. Therefore, even in death they had great respect for it, washing, wrapping, using spices, giving proper burial. Think of the Old Testament patriarchs, Lazarus, the son of the widow of Nam, the body of John the Baptist, the body of Jesus Himself.

While the Scriptures do not say a clear "yes or no" to cremation, certainly we should look at the practices and traditions and words of God's people through the centuries.

Health Note July 2019: Energy Drinks (reprinted from Lutheran Parish Nurse International with permission (Ipni.org)

When seeing an advertisement for energy drinks, do you want to try them? There are a number of popular brands, a few of these are Red Bull, Monster and Rockstar. The claim is to give one more energy, improve performance and increase concentration. These can be bought over the counter at any convenience store or food market. However, before purchasing the product, it is advisable to read the research and the personal testimonies that are readily available. These products can be considered non-regulated medications. Findings in the research are that the drinks contain more caffeine than 5 cups of coffee. They also contain guarana plant which has the similar effect of caffeine, the amino acid taurine, carbohydrates in the form of sugar and small amounts of vitamins. These beverages are not regulated by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), and do not come with any warning signs as do alcohol and tobacco products. They are often labeled as dietary supplements rather than food. Further, the companies are not required to identify all of the contents in the drink.

In the literature there are reports of seizures, strokes and even deaths occurring especially in young people and the elderly. Other physical concerns are withdrawal from the caffeine which can produce symptoms of severe headache, feeling tired, having trouble concentrating and unable to get adequate sleep or quality rest. Definitely alcohol should not be consumed with an energy drink. The caffeine can mask the effects of the alcohol. Individuals may feel that they are not as intoxicated a blood alcohol level may show. Mixing caffeine with alcohol may cause one to drink more because the caffeine may keep one awake longer, though not necessarily more alert and cognizant.

Energy drinks are not safe for children and teens to consume. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, the amount of caffeine in the energy beverage can cause high blood pressure, sleep problems, abnormal heart rate and increased blood sugar which can result in an untimely death. If there are existing medical problems, they can be exacerbated when drinking even a small amount of the beverage.

Additionally, in pregnancy, a small amount of caffeine is considered safe for a developing baby; however, in pregnancy it is not wise to have more than 200 mg. of caffeine a day, which is about the same amount in 2 cups of coffee. More caffeine than that may be related to a higher rate of miscarriage and can interfere with normal sleep patterns for both the mother and the fetus.

There are at least 3 things to consider before consuming energy drinks. 1) Water is almost always the best choice of fluid before, during and after physical activity. 2) Do not confuse energy drinks with sports drinks. These 2 different types of beverages do not contain the same ingredients. 3) Do not encourage or support the use of energy drinks for children, teens, the elderly or those with serious medical problems.

Inform those who consume the energy drinks of the risks that are involved, especially when individuals are exercising, drinking alcohol, pregnant or nursing, have a pre-existing heart condition or under the age of 18. The energy drinks could be harmful to health. Knowledge is power, and good health information can save lives. The more informed individuals can be, the better decisions they can make. Keeping the following Bible verse in mind, can be very good for one's health. So, whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God. (1Corinthians 10:31).

While energy drinks may help you stay awake, they often also cause rapid heart rate, irregular heart rate, and elevated blood pressure. Additionally, the "let down" when the high dose of caffeine wears off can leave you feeling more tired and "foggy" then before! I don't work nights anymore which is a blessing! I still like my morning coffee and an occasional cappuccino for a treat, but I feel adequate sleep is much better to keep us energized and alert.

TUITION INCREASE FOR 2019-2020 SCHOOL YEAR:

Trinity will be increasing their K-8 Tuition for Members and Non-Members \$100 for the upcoming school year. Fees will remain the same and tuition for PK3 and PK4 will remain the same.

Grant and Aid is still available for families. The application is on the FACTS website. There is a non-reimbursable \$35 fee for applying.

Families applying for Grant and Aid may begin that process March 1. Applications MUST be submitted by July 26 for consideration. It does require some documents to be included with the application. *You must reapply each year.*

FACTS opened on March 1st for new students and *any changes* to current accounts. Current students are enrolled automatically in the FACTS system. Please remember you can update your information at any time.

If you know of a family that we should send this information to, please contact our office with their information and we will be happy to email/mail them this document.



TRINITY LUTHERAN SCHOOL Frequently Asked Questions

1. What makes Trinity different?

We believe in helping every student grow academically, in character, and in faith. We excitedly proclaim salvation in Jesus Christ in all that we do. Our approach to education and classroom management is motivated by the understanding that every student is a unique child of God and loved by Him. Our teachers work to help the students live moral lives that value themselves and others. We also want our children to experience the wonders of His creation and have regular opportunities for enrichment with field trips and other extra-curricular activities.

2. What are the class sizes?

The average class size is 10-15 students. Our teachers K-8 hold a KS teaching license and participate in continuing education to improve their knowledge and skills.

3. What is the cost to send my child(ren)?

Trinity offers Preschool for children ages 3 and 4. The cost for the PK3 program is \$650 (\$65 per month) for the year. The cost for the PK4 program is \$850 (\$85 per month) for the full year. PK programs require a \$50 enrollment fee. Registration begins in March. K-8 Tuition:

All students PK-8 have Family Activity Fee of \$15 (per family)
All students K-8 have an Activity Fee of \$35.00 (per student)
Textbook, Technology, Dress Down, and Family Activity Fees are due with first payment.
Activity Fee of \$35 may be paid with tuition payment(s).

Grant and Aid: Tuition assistance is available to families. There is a \$35 non-reimbursable application fee. For more information refer to the Parent Handbook or contact our office.

Our school utilizes a tuition management system called FACTS. Navigate to the school website at www.tlsks.org and go to the Admissions tab for information, including Financial Aid.

4. Is Trinity a KS accredited school? Yes. Trinity participates in the KS State Assessments.

5. What is the curriculum?

Our curriculum is based on the KS College and Career Standards. Our religion curriculum is through One in Christ. We integrate technology in our instruction and assessment and use data to focus on student strengths and needs.

6. Does Trinity have extra-curricular opportunities?

Yes. Students have opportunity to participate in Athletics (grades 4-8 depending on sport) and Academic Competitions with other Lutheran Schools. We also participate in the Gathering of the Talents through Concordia University.

7. Can my child attend if they are not of the Lutheran faith?

Of course! We are here to serve all students and families in the community who desire a quality Christian education. We have many students from different congregations.

8. If my child has special needs, is Trinity able to provide services?

Trinity receives support through Atchison Public Schools (USD 409) Special Education services for students who are on IEPs. Services such as speech, PT, and OT are administered on site. Trinity also receives Title I services through USD 409 where students are identified for additional help in math and reading. Those services are provided on site.

9. How do students get to and from school?

Families are responsible for getting their children to and from school. Carpooling is encouraged. We do not provide bus transportation.

10. What do students wear?

Trinity has a standardized dress code. We believe standardized dress improves academic focus and helps create an orderly educational environment for our students.
