Vicky was a graduate of Trinity School and well-known in our church and community for the childcare ministry she had in her home. On July 15th, services were held for Lou Roberts, 80. Lou became a member of Trinity through Confirmation on December 26, 1982. On July 28th, Mike Guidry, 80, was called by our Lord to his eternal home. No funeral service was held. While in good health, Mike was always faithful in worship, Bible Class and attended many of our T.E.A.M. classes. We pray our Lord's comfort to those who mourn the loss of these loved ones. BIG NEWS

The big news at Trinity right now is "no air-conditioning in the sanctuary." On Saturday, July 6th, there was a power surge which took out the units that cooled the sanctuary. So, on July 7th and Sunday, July 14th, we

worshiped in the sanctuary with the temperature in the mid 80's. We used some old hand-fans from our store room and borrowed some of the same from Becker-Dyer. On July 21st and 28th, we worshiped in the gym. Our furnaces and air-conditioners were put in in 1992. Because of their age and size complications, we are having to replace all. The bid for doing all of this is \$43,320. So far our insurance company has sent us a check for \$20,992.00 our insurance deductible is \$5,000. We expect to receive more insurance money after the work of replacing is complete.

"EVERYONE HIS WITNESS"

We are looking forward to the one-day workshop, "Everyone His Witness", which we will have on Saturday, August 17th. It will be led by Rev. Dan Galchutt from the Kansas District Office. The workshop is about witnessing in our everyday lives and contacts, to show us how and

And thank you to all who have made generous gifts to pay for it.

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THE FINANCIAL PICTURE

July was not a good month for our Financial Picture. No air-conditioning plus the Amelia Earhart Festival, plus vacations really hurt our Sunday worship attendance. The "behind" in the Home Budget almost doubled.

As you can see we are BEHIND \$34,873.26 in the HOME budget, BEHIND \$5,226.22 in the MISSION budget and AHEAD \$652.28 in the BUILDING budget. Since Pastor Ockree left, being behind in the home budget has not been a problem because we did not have that salary to pay. Now, however that Pastor Reed is coming on board, this will be a problem. We will need to do much catching up and then maintaining. We pray that you will help this to happen.

The above figure for the Building Fund indicates that we are ahead in that area. The "ahead" is because of the special gifts given on Debt-Down Sunday. In the area of weekly needs, we are really behind. All of this seems complicated and if you have questions, please ask.

On July 28th, (\$119 in '019) \$5,136.19 was given by 40 members. We are praying that many more members will participate in this special offering for Dream Fund III.

Also, we are now looking for 40 sponsors for our 2019-20 School Sponsor Plan. We now have six (6) sponsors, 34 to go. In July we received a gift of \$500.00 from a nonmember who believes in the mission of Trinity School. When you give to this, be sure to mark your gift "School Sponsor Plan".

BUILDING AND GROUNDS FOUNDATION

Since the beginning of the year, this foundation has received \$434.00 in gifts. It now has given-assets of \$273,553.35. Last year the dividend and interest from this invested amount was \$17,682.16. From this amount \$15,000 is going into our regular budget to take care of building needs. The rest is saved for needs outside the budget. For example: in the next few weeks the old school building will be painted. That will be paid for out of "extra" from this foundation.

It is tremendously important that this foundation grow. We have many buildings to maintain. As these buildings grow older, the cost of maintaining will grow. Many churches become building poor or must give up their facilities because they can't maintain them.

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PARENT'S CRITICAL ROLE

LCMS (Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod) Youth Ministry recently partnered with LCMS Research to conduct an unprecedented study of young adult retention in the LCMS and in the larger Christian church. The following three paragraphs are from the report given by the research group.

Parents remain the number one person who impacts the faith lives of young people. Nearly 1 in 3 young adults listed a parent as one of the most influential people in their lives. While that influence was usually positive, those who left the LCMS were more than twice as likely to say a parent had a negative influence (13% vs 5%).

Today's Active LCMS youth adults were the most likely to see a high level of faith practiced by their parents. This included frequent Bible reading at home, praying as a family, regular church attendance of both parents together (continuing even today), and at least one parent having a service or leadership role in the church. Of all the other profiles, parents of Nominal LCMS are least likely to be leaders in the church, read the Bible with their children and attend worship regularly now or in the past. Young people cannot emulate faith behavior they don't see. When parents don't prioritize worship and congregational engagement, young people won't either.

Today's Active LCMS were also the most likely to report having a good relationship with parents in high school. They related well with parents in general, specifically with dad. They felt they could talk to both parents about life issues and could talk openly with at least one parent about faith. They felt safe bringing up their questions and doubts to their parents. When parents are open to tough conversations about life and faith, young people are more likely to stay in the church.

Measles: A Preventable Crisis

Immunization: Worldwide Protection

August is national immunization awareness month. The following is a brief history of vaccinations and a focus on increased occurrence of measles worldwide and in the United States. Please make sure your child's vaccinations are up to date.

Over two millennia ago in ancient China, someone noticed that people who recovered from certain diseases never became re-infected. Acting on this finding, they tried to prevent disease by inoculating themselves with a bit of infected matter. That idea bumbled through history until Edward Jenner, in 1796, used a cowpox blister to inoculate a young boy against smallpox. The boy did not get smallpox, and the idea of vaccines grew. In the late 19th century, Louis Pasteur developed vaccines against anthrax and rabies. In the 20th century, vaccines were developed for over a dozen more diseases, including polio, measles and tetanus. Research and discovery continue, improving known vaccines and developing new ones.

Today, children and adults of all ages can be protected against such diseases as measles, mumps, rubella, polio, hepatitis, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, chicken pox, shingles, influenza, pneumococcal pneumonia, meningococcal meningitis, yellow fever and more, by administering weakened or dead virus to make antibodies to stimulate immunity. This works when the body's immune cells, called macrophages, digest most of the injected material but keep a portion, called antigens, to create memory of it in the immune system. Antigens combine with white blood cells, the lymphocytes, to trigger the desired immune response when exposed to the disease. With some vaccines, a single dose produces desired immunity; with others, multiple doses or boosters are required.

Measles is a highly contagious childhood viral infection. Even today with a safe and effective vaccine, it remains a significant cause of death in young people globally, especially children under age 5. It is recommended that children receive two doses of the measles vaccine which is combined with mumps and rubella (MMR). The first dose at 12 to 15 months and again between 4 - 6 years. Older children and adults are advised on an individual basis.

Measles, also called rubeola, is transmitted by nasal and oral droplets from an infected individual. Signs and symptoms appear 10 - 14 days after exposure. Symptoms typically begin with a fever and may include persistent cough, runny nose, inflamed eyes (conjunctivitis), diarrhea, and sore throat with tiny white spots inside the mouth. A skin rash develops several days later. This rash generally begins on the face and gradually spreads downward. The virus infection follows sequential stages over a period to 2 - 3 weeks.

An individual is contagious for approximately eight days, starting four days before the rash appears and ending when the rash has been present for four days. Infected droplets can land on a surface and remain contagious for several hours. About 90 percent of susceptible individuals exposed to the virus will develop measles.

Severe complications occur more frequently in poorly nourished children, especially those deficient in vitamin A. Complications may include bacterial ear infection, bronchitis, pneumonia, dehydration, encephalitis and even death. In addition, measles during pregnancy can cause preterm labor, low birth weight and even maternal death.

Currently there is a measles crisis in the Philippines. In the last month, 70 deaths were reported mainly in children. During the first five weeks of 2019, the United States has confirmed 101 individual cases of measles in 10 states. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), worldwide cases of measles increased by about 50 percent last year. The outbreaks have been blamed on a backlash against vaccinations and misinformation. Despite evidence disproving a 1998 claim that linked the measles, mumps and rubella vaccine to autism, lingering doubt and skepticism remain along with the ability to share misinformation on social media. "Vaccine hesitancy" has been added to WHO's list of top health threats.
