Health Note for September 2019: Cholesterol, what is it and why is it important

September is national cholesterol education month, so I thought it might be a good health topic. Cholesterol is a waxy, fat-like substance found in our bodies and many foods. Our bodies need cholesterol to function normally and our bodies are capable of making all the cholesterol we need. Cholesterol levels are measured by a simple blood test that is taken after fasting for 8-12 hours.

This is where is gets more complicated. To check cholesterol your health care provider will typically order what is called a lipid profile. When cholesterol is measured in the blood what is actually measured is the 2 lipoproteins that carry cholesterol through the body. The first is low-density lipoprotein or LDL, so called "bad" cholesterol. This makes up most of the body's cholesterol. The second is high-density lipoprotein or HDL, so called "good" cholesterol because it absorbs cholesterol and carries is back to the liver where it is flushed from the body. A lipid profile will also typically measure triglycerides which is type of fat found in the blood that our bodies use for energy.

So why is all this important? High levels of LDL (bad cholesterol) can lead to plaque buildup in your arteries and result in heart disease or stroke. The combination of high levels of LDL and high triglycerides increases your risk for heart attack and stroke. Having high levels of HDL (good cholesterol) can lower your risk of heart disease or stroke. High cholesterol typically doesn't have any symptoms. The National Cholesterol Education Program recommends that adults 20 years old or older have their cholesterol checked every 5 years. Your health care provider may want you to have your cholesterol checked more frequently if someone in your family had a heart attack early in life. Some people have a genetic condition called familial hypercholesterolemia which causes high levels of LDL (bad cholesterol) beginning at a young age.

There are things you can do to lower your LDL cholesterol and triglycerides and maintain healthy levels. Number 1 is a healthy diet which is not new news! Limit food high in saturated fat such as: fatty meats, cheese, dairy desserts. Choose food low in saturated fat such as: lean meat, seafood, fat free or low fat milk, cheese, and yogurt, whole grains, fruit and vegetables. Also eating foods naturally high in fiber helps such as oatmeal and beans. Other factors that can help lower cholesterol are: maintain healthy weight, get regular physical activity, and limit alcohol intake. None of us live a healthy lifestyle all the time, but I like to remember the verse, "So whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God." (1 Corinthians 10:31)

What an amazing and enriching seven days, from travel experiences to the National Youth Gathering events, to minor dramas, to hotel issues and commuting issues, everyone in the Trinity group learned more about each other, getting along, working together, helping each other, worshiping and most importantly growing in faith and sharing that experience.

The leadership of Jason and Jennifer Curley and Neil Wieland was excellent. They worked hard and slept little. The students responded very well as a group. I was proud to be among them and helping. I helped with the grunt work, but the most fun was making lunch sandwiches in the hotel room at 5:30 in the morning, a good time. Nights were short. We usually left the hotel by 7:00 and returned as late as 12:30 a.m.

Each day began with a walk to the light rail train. We rode the train to downtown Minneapolis, a ride that took thirty-five minutes. Once off the train, we got to walk another twenty minutes to the Convention Center or the Hilton Inn, where we did Bible reflections of the previous day and attended an opening session that was a praise service and day-overview. The Gathering theme, "Real, Present, God," as described in Psalm 46, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble," was emphasized. After the opening, learning sessions were offered each hour through 4:00 p.m. Most of the sessions were in the Convention Center, so we walked again.

There were over ninety sessions offered to the students, most taught by Pastors or Lutheran college professors. Our students chose topics that interested them personally, but a few were chosen by the Leaders and made mandatory, especially the ones involving dating and sex. Most of us attended one on Evangelism. My favorite session was entitled "Mustaches, Fig Leaves, and Instagram: How Jesus Sets Us Free to Be Ourselves." It was taught by an urban Pastor from Salem, Oregon. It was exceptional and meaningful. If you would like further explanation of the topic, just ask me.

The day's Sessions ended at 5:00 p.m. All twenty thousand of the event participants now had two hours to find an evening dinner and walk, yet again, over to the Viking's football stadium for the nightly mass event. The mass event began at 8:00 p.m. The doors opened at 7:00, and it pretty much took that hour for everyone to make it into the stadium and claim the best seat possible. The mass event lasted two hours or more, and it was a praise service with scripture readings, multiple presentations and lots of contemporary singing. On three of the evenings there was extra entertainment provided, of special note was a Toby Mac concert. At the end of all the festivities, 20,000 plus people exit the stadium using the same three exit locations. At least a third of the people are rushing to the light rail to get back to the hotel. So, our day is finally finished after another long ride and another walk to our hotel.

Well, this "Thank You" note has become a wordy thing, but I wanted you to get the jest of what it was like, because through all the worship, work, play and weariness, all of us experienced "aha" or "wow" moments. All of us had moments of tears, just about every session and event. All of us felt the Spirit tugging away at our hearts, moving us to new understandings, increasing our faith and giving us greater trust in God as our refuge, in a world of challenges.

Thank you for providing the funds for me to participate in this event. Praise God from whom all blessings flow.
