Our HOME budget income took a big drop in September. At the beginning of September we were BEHIND \$35,836.31 in the HOME budget. At the END of September we are BEHIND 45,245.03. PASTOR REED

Pastor Reed is a new addition to the staff of Trinity Lutheran Church, serving as Associate Pastor. He began his duties on September 1.

Pastor Reed was born and raised just south of San Francisco, California. Unfortunately, his parents didn't take him to church as a boy and he grew up not knowing Jesus and His salvation, though he considered himself to be a Christian.

After High School, he served in the U.S. Navy and visited many countries in the Pacific Ocean, traveling as far south as New Zealand. During one cruise, he remembers the ocean appearing as smooth as glass, with only the ship's wake disturbing the water. On another cruise, he remembers super-size waves caused by a typhon that swept over the sides of the ship.

After the Navy, Pastor Reed worked a few years as a telephone technician in San Francisco. It was during this time that he first heard the Good News about Jesus. Through the ministry of Christians from Holy Spirit Lutheran Church in San Francisco, God gave Pastor Reed the gift of faith in Jesus. He was baptized and confirmed on Christmas Day.

God also gave Pastor Reed the desire to learn how to better tell others the Good News. So, he quit his job to attend Concordia University in Irvine, California, where he met his future wife, Mrs. Laurie Reed, currently Trinity's First Grade teacher. After the Reeds were married, Pastor Reed became a student at Concordia Seminary in Saint Louis, Missouri, and graduated in 1993.

During his 25-years of ministry, Pastor Reed has served churches in Wyoming, California, and Missouri and he still enjoys telling people about Jesus. For the last decade or so, he also served as a chaplain of the Missouri State Highway Patrol and would occasionally ride along with troopers, developing relationship, and hoping for an opportunity to speak the Gospel.

In his spare time, Pastor Reed enjoys woodworking and DIY projects.

The Reformation

In October we celebrate the Reformation! October 31st is a special day for Lutherans. While most people think of October 31st as Halloween, Lutherans remember this date as "Reformation Day". Why?

On October 31, 1517, an Augustinian monk posted 95 statements for discussion on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. Dr. Martin Luther hoped these 95 statements (i.e. "the Ninety-five Theses") would spark an academic debate within the church on topics such as repentance, indulgences, and other concerns. Church leaders, however, didn't want a debate. Eventually, Luther was excommunicated and judged a heretic. But that didn't stop Luther.

Luther's reforms centered on three solas (sola is Latin for alone): sola Scriptura (Scripture alone), sola gratia (grace alone), and sola fide (faith alone). Luther preached, taught, wrote and debated that a sinner is justified by God's grace alone, through faith in Jesus Christ alone, as revealed in the Scriptures alone. Luther's work sparked religious reforms throughout Germany and in many European countries. The Gospel is powerful! Romans 1:16, "I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes."



Although there were many notable events during Luther's life and course of the Reformation, today we look at October 31st as Reformation Day because in 1667 (150 years after Luther posted the Ninety-five Theses), elector John George II of Saxony designated this day to commemorate Luther's work of pointing Christians to the joy of the Gospel. May we always recall the blessings of the Reformation, especially on October 31st.

FIFTY YEARS AGO

Fifty years ago, October 1969, we started the Trinity Lutheran School Endowment Fund.

There were twelve "charter" givers to the fund: Larry Kruger, Pastor Ziegler, Harvey Buckley, Karl Ohlmann, Nelson Welsh, Bill Zabel, Ted Buddenbohm, Durel Seetin, Bill Niemann, Ernie Schmidt, Don Kempin and Bob Volk. Their gifts added together amounted to \$635.00. Since then the Lord has blessed this fund. Today, October 3rd, 2019, the fund has "given" assets of \$1,520,062.14.

We received our first dividend from the fund on March 31, 1970. It was from Allegheny Power System, Inc., and the amount was \$3.30. 1970 was the first full year that we received interest and dividends from the fund's investments. That amount that year was \$191.95. In 2018 dividend and interest income was \$160,679.98.

What a GREAT BLESSING this fund has been to our Trinity School. It has helped pay teachers salaries. Teacher education, purchased carpeting, audio-visual equipment, VCR, videos, books, tables, chairs, desks, overhead projection, computers, software, filing cabinets, lowered ceilings and light fixtures in the old school, tuck-pointed the new building, purchased air-conditioners, paid moving expenses for teachers, LEA conventions and memberships, and MORE and MORE.

The following men are on the Endowment Board which oversees the fund and makes investment decisions: Ron Estes, chairman; Ed Bosshammer, secretary; Bryan Becker, treasurer; Don Kempin, Scott Taft, Adam Goodpasture and Pastor Ziegler. Others who have served on this Board in the past were: Ted Schmidt, Floyd Ruhnke, Bob Volk, Francis Burchett, Roy Estes, Hank Schlattman, Larry Kruger, Jim Duitsman, Lou Boknecht, Ron Graham. Betty Jamison-Sowers was our dividend income treasurer, Monica Donaldson fills that position.

In the next couple of months, we are going to send a 50th Anniversary letter and leaflet to all who have attended or been part of Trinity School. In thanksgiving for 50 years of blessings we will be asking for a generous gift. Our goal is \$50,000 for 50 years.

Looking to the future, let's pray God's continued blessings upon this very important fund. THANK you to ALL who through the years have so generously remembered this fund with gifts, memorials and bequests.

The Nurture of Nature

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. (Genesis 1:1) God called the dry ground 'land' and the gathered waters 'seas'. And God saw that it was good. Then God said 'Let the land produce vegetation; seed bearing plants and trees on the land that bear fruit with seed in it according to their various kinds'. And God saw that it was good. (Genesis 1:10, 11)

Reading on in Genesis, after creating living creatures for the water, land and sky, and creating mankind in his own image, God saw that all he had created was very good, as stated in Genesis 1:31. God saw all that he had made, and it was very good. God created the heavens and the earth, clean air, light, the sea, lakes, rivers, streams, mountains, meadows, forests; sea creatures, birds and animals to inhabit the earth, and humans to enjoy and care for this world.

It seems only natural then that getting outdoors to experience and appreciate nature ... to pause to give God glory ... to pray and meditate in his creation ... to allow his created beauty to nurture us, has been proven to benefit us physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually in many ways.

Be still and know that I am God. (Psalm 46:10)

Studies have found that getting into nature settings for relaxation and renewal decreases anxiety, stress, anger and depression. Levels of serotonin increase to help improve mood, focus, memory, self-esteem and energy levels. Quiet time in nature boosts creativity and increases problem-solving abilities. It can nudge our brains into new thoughts. The emotion of awe gives a mental boost and drives the benefits of physical, mental, social and spiritual well-being. Being around or with others in a natural setting adds a sense of community, sharing and social connection.

Physical benefits are numerous. Sunlight helps us produce Vitamin D, which is important for such things as bone health, a strong immune system, absorption of minerals such as calcium and phosphorous and other essential functions. Spending time outdoors can help in maintaining healthy weight. People are more likely to increase movement and exercise because it's easy and convenient to just walk out the door. Walking in the push of the wind and on uneven terrain, biking or gardening, all help to burn more calories. Exercise, along with light and dark cycles, help to adjust our internal clock, allowing for better sleep, adding even more health benefits to getting outdoors. Related and connected benefits to all of the above, are decreased inflammation, lowered blood sugar, cholesterol; lowered incidence of stroke, heart disease, cancer, asthma and improved management of pain.

He makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside quiet waters. He restores my soul. (Psalm 23:2, 3)

The presence of water has been found to enhance the many positive effects of being in nature. In one study, students were found to have less near-sightedness. Also, stress hormones and blood pressure, lung and kidney disease were reduced. Memory and brain health were found improved. Healing took place faster and reported pain levels were lower.

Time spent outdoors can support health care and therapies, save costs, decrease the use of medications, and increase productivity at work and school. Wellness and reported overall health are improved. God rested at Creation, and Jesus took time to rest and renew. May we find peace, gratitude, joy and renewal as we take time and opportunity to be nurtured in God's awesome creation!

Jail Ministry? Why jail ministry? Does Jesus truly want His followers to go behind bars and minister to people who have committed serious crimes?

"......For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'

"Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?'

"The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." MATTHEW 25:34-40

Most every Tuesday night for the last three years I have gone to the Atchison County Jail to do a Bible Study. It seemed like a natural extension of what I had done for twenty-three years. Some of you know I taught at the Atchison Juvenile Correctional Facility. My students were juvenile delinquent middle school and high school age boys. They were imprisoned for anything and everything that adults were incarcerated for. So, when I was getting close to full retirement I started looking for ways to serve. Jail ministry seemed like a good fit.

Also, what led me to Jail Ministry was my wife Lois and her commitment to serve the incarcerated through a program called "Angel Tree". Some of you here at Trinity have been recruited by her for this program. In a nutshell, this is what Angel Tree does: Volunteers from an organization called Prison Fellowship go into a prison and ask prisoners (mothers and fathers) if they have a child at home that they would like to send a Christmas present to, in their name. Volunteers in the prisoner's community buy gifts for these children and deliver them in their incarcerated parent's name, along with "The Good News" of Jesus' birth found in the book of Luke.



So here I am three years into this. Tuesday nights from roughly 8:00 to 10:00 PM I go and present the Gospel. I bring the hope of a loving, merciful, graceful God to those who are feeling hopeless, unloved and full of shame. The looks on their faces sometimes when God's word penetrates their guilty, hurting soul is a Divine experience. God just touched a soul. There are three dorms called Pods at the jail A and B Pods are for men and C is for women. I see them one Pod at a time. They come into a central recreation area. It is optional for them to attend, I will see anywhere from 5 to 20 individuals a night. I also give them a blank note card to write a prayer on. I explain that I take their prayers back to our Prayer Ministry. Those of you in 8 to 8 give these people hope and encouragement by your praying for them. I invite them to come to our church when they get out. Some of them have told me they would. I have not had a taker yet. I provide them a Bible if they need one. We pray together, we read scripture together and the last thing we do is sing a hymn. It is amazing to me how enthusiastically they sing when they don't know the melody. We make a joyful noise unto the Lord.
