- a. Arrive early so you aren't rushed.
- b. Offer a warm greeting to each person, starting with the person in front of you.
- c. Be on the lookout for people who are alone or lost. Say, "Hi!"
- d. Introduce yourself and learn people's names.
- e. Introduce people to others you know.
- f. Take responsibility for welcoming those within 10 feet of you, especially those who may be alone.
- g. Spend at least 3 minutes before and after worship talking to someone you don't know well.

By now you should have received your special Lenten devotional booklet and the little fish. I pray that each day during Lent you will set aside time to read the devotion, reflect on the question at the end of devotion and pray the sentence prayer. Let the little fish remind you to do this and also to come to our Lenten services.

May this Lenten Season be for you a time of spiritual renewal and growth.

BE PREPARED TO ANSWER PEOPLE WHO SAY, “I DON’T WANT TO GO TO CHURCH!”

Deep down, many people feel they need church, but they can't quite get themselves to go. Some say, “I had religion crammed down my throat as a child.” And others, “Life is a rat race. I need a day off. I don't need the hassle of getting up on Sunday, getting dressed, and rushing off to church.” And still others, “I have better things to do with my time on Sunday.”

The Bible, however, tells us that worship is a blessing to both children and adults. The Gospel of Jesus Christ proclaimed in church offers the rest and refreshment, and the peace and joy, all people long for. After all, in this world who will ever have enough time for all the things we need and want to do? No one! Everyone must set priorities.

WHAT IS MOST IMPORTANT IN LIFE?

God! This is God’s world. God made it and God is the boss.

Our first parents, Adam and Eve spoiled God's perfect world, and we've had problems ever since. A few hundred years ago, many people hoped that the world would get better and better. Remember World War I? It was called “the war to end all wars.” But no. It was followed by World War II and many other wars and conflicts. The world isn’t getting better and better. In fact, most people would say the opposite: it's getting worse and worse!

So, what is wrong with the world? We can sum that up in the three-letter word, “sin.” Sin leads to pride and selfishness. Sin stirs up envy and hatred. Most people want to be good, try to do good things, but all thoughts, all emotions, and all words and actions are tainted by the sin passed down to us from our first parents. That’s why we are imperfect. We cannot please God, who is perfect and holy, by what we say and do. We can only anger Him.

But God has provided the way out of this sinful predicament. That’s what we focus on all year long, and it comes into sharp focus during Lent and Holy Week. Jesus Christ, God’s Son, suffered and died on the cross and paid the penalty for our sin. God forgives us our sins, whether they are “large” or “small” when we acknowledge them to Him and trust in His forgiving grace in Jesus Christ, who died and rose again.

BUT WHY CHURCH? WHY GO TO CHURCH? ISN’T IT ENOUGH TO SIMPLY ‘BELIEVE’?

Just knowing what is most important is not enough. Faith is more than knowledge. Faith is alive and moves us to also act on what we believe. To truly believe in Jesus means to live our lives by what He has done and what He says. Gathering in God’s house at the appointed time of worship is one of the most basic and important ways we exercise faith. In church you confess your faith and nourish your faith. And your presence in God’s house also encourages others around you in the Faith.

At a church service, we worship the God who made us; the God who redeemed us through His Son, Jesus Christ, and the God who preserves us and the entire universe. In a church service we are told again and again that Jesus has conquered death, that through Jesus we will live with God eternally, and we need not fear death. In a church service, again and again we hear how Jesus paid for our sins and gives us a right standing before His Father. In a church service we receive peace, so we need not be upset or overcome by the daily problems and troubles that come as we live in this broken world.

WHO NEEDS CHURCH?

In a word, everyone! Those who yet do not know God through His Son Jesus Christ certainly need to come to church and learn about Him. Also believing Christians need church, need to worship God together, and need to strengthen and encourage one another. A church service builds us up so we can face all the problems and challenges that will come in the week ahead.

SO WHY NOT EXTEND A KINDLY INVITATION?

Invite others to worship! Perhaps the following questions can be useful: Why not come with me to worship God with fellow Christians in a joyful church service this Sunday morning? Why not try it? Why not come and see the wonderful blessing you have been missing!

Every One His Witness (E1HW)

If you who went through the Every One His Witness seminar at the end of summer last year, remember the **LASSIE** method and keep using it. **LASSIE: Listen-Ask-Seek-Share-Invite-and-Encourage**. This relational, contextual witnessing helps us to share the Good News of Jesus Christ as we **Listen-Ask-Seek-Share-Invite-and-Encourage** people in our lives who are not yet part of the Church.



And remember, having completed the Every One His Witness workshop, you have access to additional context modules. Inside your participant workbook you'll find a code that allows you access to the everyonehiswitness.org website. Once registered, you can take additional modules. Currently, seven are available. Coming soon is the module, Witnessing to People with Depression and Anxiety. Below are titles and descriptions of two modules that perked my interest.

Witnessing to De-churched Adult Children— This module is for those with children or grandchildren who were raised in the church but, for whatever reason, have left the church. You'll learn how to use the LASSIE approach to address the special challenges of witnessing to family members.

Responding to Scientism— Many people today are influenced by a worldview called scientism, which elevates science as the ultimate authority and source of truth. As Christians, we know that God is

the ultimate authority and source of truth, and that science is a good gift from God. This context module addresses the intersection of faith and science and provides helpful resources for engaging in conversations with our family, friends, and neighbors.

Health Note for March

Health Note for March 2020

Healthy Eyes

Our sight is important to God. Scripture tells of our Lord opening the eyes of the blind, often connecting people's physical sight with spiritual understanding.



The eye, this miraculous, complex organ, structured with intricate detail, works in conjunction with brain, muscles, and other systems for eye movement, reflex and vision. The iris, pupil, lens, optic nerve, retina, vitreous body and many other parts of the eye necessary for vision, are protected and enhanced by the production of tears and the structure of eyelids for the act of blinking.

From infancy through adulthood, eyes need to be protected and nourished to remain healthy and functional. In small children, avoiding injuries through close supervision with pencils, forks, scissors and any other potentially harmful object is essential. Looking into the sun or laser pointers can cause rapid and permanent damage to a child's retina. By teaching children proper eye care and handwashing, damage, irritations and some diseases can be prevented and spreading of infections avoided. Through close observation by parents, teachers, nurses and others, children with vision problems or eye irregularities can be recognized and helped early, avoiding complications.

In adulthood, certain eye conditions and diseases become more common. Age-related vision changes, diabetic neuropathy, cataracts, glaucoma, and retinitis are some examples. When caught early, many can be controlled, and complications avoided. Regular eye exams, protection from sun, keeping our bodies in optimum health overall and eating for eye health, are some actions we can observe ourselves and teach to others to aid in maintaining healthy eyes.

Following are some of the foods that help promote good eye health. Among the vegetables are kale, collard greens, peppers, broccoli, sweet potatoes, carrots, spinach, peas, pumpkin, and Swiss chard. Fruits include peaches, blueberries, citrus fruits, mango, tomato, apricot, papaya, cantaloupe, honeydew and avocado. Foods high in zinc are beneficial, including king crab, lamb, bulgur, lean beef and pork, poultry dark meat, buckwheat, pumpkin seeds and beans. Omega 3-rich foods such as salmon, herring, tuna, mackerel, sardines, rainbow trout, flaxseed, English walnuts, canola oil, and roasted soybeans are also excellent. May we strive for the best possible health of sight for both body and soul!


