UNCERTAIN TIMES

To say the least, these are extraordinary and very uncertain times. Because it is so hard to plan for tomorrow, we will not be sending a calendar with this Newsletter. Last Sunday, March 22nd, Trinity had its first-ever streamed worship service. Thank you to Jeremy Blanton and all who worked with him to make this possible. Several hundred people watched this abbreviated service. We will continue to do this as long as the stay-at-home orders and limited gathering rules are in place. Instead of four Easter Services one will be streamed. 7.000 homes in our area will receive our Easter Invitation listing four services. This mailing was planned and paid for before any of the virus limitations were ever suggested. At this time, we are also planning to stream the Good Friday service at 7:00 p.m.

Thank you to all who have brought or sent their offerings to the church office. Although little is happening right now at 8th and Laramie and 8th and Kearney, expenses and salaries continue. So please, continue to send or bring your offerings.

Besides the streaming, please remember our KAIR Broadcast at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday mornings. Also, watch Facebook for announcements, changes, etc.

Finally, continue to pray God's guidance, protection and blessings during this time, that a medical answer will soon be found, that in the meantime we may find in Him the strength and courage and hope we need day-by-day. The following prayer was sent from our District Office: "Lord God, you have called Your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go but only that Your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

SOME HISTORY

The following is a report printed in the <u>Cape</u> <u>Girardeau Patriot</u> on May 30, 1839, describing some new settlers in Perry County:

"We understand that a company of Germans amounting to 700, have lately settled in Perry County, Missouri, and purchased, in a body, 10,000 acres of land in what is called Brazeau Bottom, the best part of the county. They are of the Lutheran persuasion and have a library of 20,000 volumes and intend shortly to establish a college. The Germans are our honest industrious people, and a desirable population."

The settlers were our LCMS forefathers coming from Germany and the college they were soon to establish was Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. But, note, how many books they brought with them from Germany.

SCHOOL ENDOWMENT FUND

Since the beginning of the year, the School Endowment Fund has received \$41,990.10 in gifts, memorials and farm income. This brings the given assets of this fund to \$1,568,471.34. Actual dividend income in 2019 was \$168,363.62. Projected income for 2020 is \$178,441.00. Of this amount, \$175,500.00 is going into our home budget to help pay teacher's salaries. The income received so far this year should add another \$1,230.00 to this year's projected income. We are hoping, though, with the current economic problems, no dividends will be cut.

Of the gifts received this year, \$19,205.00 has come from the special 50th Anniversary Offering. \$24,000.00 has come from farm income.

The following memorials have been received: Wilbur Neill - \$50.00; Roger Nelson, Sam Nelson and Charlie Nelson - \$1,000.00; Clarence and Rose Marie Miles - \$250.00; Jody and Jeff Woodruff - \$100.00; Sharon Oestmann - \$500.00; and Carilyn Blasi - \$30.00.

A gift of \$96.00 was received in honor of Lois Estes on her 96th birthday.

Along with their gifts, several former students have sent notes telling about their fond memories of Trinity School and how blessed they were for the opportunity. We are praying that many more of our graduates and former students will participate in our special 50th Offering.

Health note for April

When one wants to achieve good health, we typically consider diet and physical exercise. Health is also affected by attitude, stressors, coping mechanisms, and socialization.

Friends come in different forms, under many circumstances, and during various seasons of our lives. Outsiders may look at a large gathering in our honor and wonder why this group of people came together. The scriptures give us a glimpse of the friendships of Jesus. Matthew 9:9-13 discusses how the Pharisees were somewhat mystified that Jesus would dine with lowly tax collectors and sinners. He replied that he desired mercy, not sacrifice. Jesus called sinners, not the righteous. He knew it would be this group that people could relate to in the generations to come. Friendship and closeness was very evident in this group.

John 11:1-45 reveals that Jesus had other close relationships. He loved his friends Mary, Martha, and Lazarus. He told the disciples that their friend Lazarus had died, and then tried to comfort these friends in their grief. This group depended on each other to cope with this difficult situation.

Our friends may not be what others expect, although we are healthier because of them. Bonds are forged at different times in our lives. In times of crisis, these friends come close and increase our ability to cope. The ability to share our deeply held personal feelings may decrease our stress, and possibly help to avert depression. We depend on our friends to listen to our fears, and to share our tears and sadness when the unexpected happens in our lives. There are positive outcomes and increased outlooks when we can share such intimate feelings while being vulnerable. The response from friends brings closeness and increased support which can actually decrease mortality.

Having a network of friends, as well as a number of close friends, has been found to increase our happiness. This, in turn, boosts our health. Our mental health affects our physical wellbeing in a positive or negative way. Friendships are crucial in protecting our mental health. Having friends is having a safe harbor in which to weather the storm of stressful situations. It has been found that the more friends we have the better our mental, physical, and emotional health. Happiness and positive emotions from close friendships may just be the key one needs to improve overall good health!
