OUR BUILDING COMMITTEE A REPORT

In 1998 on the day we dedicated the "finished part" of the new building, we started Dream Fund III. We did that because we realized that we still needed a building that would take care of various church ministries, i.e. Adult Bible Classes, Sunday School rooms, quilting, offices, youth activities, childcare, restrooms, etc.

Since 1989 the debt on the new building has been paid, Trinity Place has been built, the Garage/Maintenance Building built, church windows covered, a new roof put on the church, new furnaces and air-conditioning in the church, new doors on the church, the church basement and kitchen remodeled, lots of technology put in place, the old school painted, etc., etc.

In March 2017, serious talk about restrooms on the first floor of the church were began. Out of these talks came the need for an Ad Hoc Committee to study Trinity's future ministry and building needs. This committee was formed and did its work in the Fall of 2017. From its work came the decision to form a Building Committee, hire an architect and begin putting together building plans. Members selected from the Building Committee were, Bryan Becker (chairman), Jim Duitsman, Rachel Goodpasture, Bart Lennington (secretary), and Terry Mills. After several meetings the committee voted to hire Larry Lisbona as architect (1-8-19). Since then, several meetings have been held and different ideas and plans considered.

Two main plans have been considered. One plan was to tear down the yellow school building, build everything between the church and the new school building, connecting everything to the church. The second plan was to build between the church and yellow building. In this area would be restrooms, childcare, to expand the narthex and long hallway which would lead to a three-floor building would be the church offices, meeting rooms, quilting room, rooms for Bible classes and Sunday school. The committee has voted to pursue this second plan.

However, before we have the architect draw final plans, there are several things we want to do in preparation. We want to pay off our present debt on the Garage/Maintenance Building, make provision for supporting the building after it is in place, add to Dream Fund III, build resources for maintaining our present buildings during construction and paying off the new building debt.

This may seem like a lot. It is. But, we want to plan and prepare carefully so we do not jeopardize our present ministries, staff positions or Trinity School.

We are asking our architect to prepare a picture of what we want to build. We hope to have it by the last Sunday in July when we will have our annual offering for Dream Fund III this year \$120 In '020".

We are still "BUILDING A DREAM THAT WILL ENDURE". Big dreams do not come in bargain basements and they do not come over-night. They come after years of planning and praying and working and giving and God's blessings. So, let's keep planning and working and giving and praying God's blessings.

FROM THE LUTHERAN WITNESS LUTHER AND THE PLAGUE

One health care worker, Emily Yang, wrote an article for Christianity Today encouraging Christians trying to deal with the coronavirus threat to read what Martin Luther had to say about the plague. In 1527, a much worse affliction than the coronavirus – the black plague, which had wiped out half of Europe's population two centuries earlier – broke out in Wittenberg. The city panicked. Many people dropped everything and ran away. In response, Luther wrote an open letter titled "Whether One May Flee from a Deadly Plague" (LW 43:119-38).

Luther looked at the issue in terms of vocation. If you are a physician, a government official, have family obligations or are a pastor, you need to stay where God has placed you to serve. Realize that whether you live or whether you die, you are in God's hands. Otherwise, you are free to leave. (Luther stayed.) You have an obligation of self-preservation. Make use of medical care and public health measures, such as quarantines. Above all, though Christians must do whatever they can to help their neighbors in their time of need.

When "a deadly epidemic strikes," said Luther, we should "take courage in the fact that we are mutually bound together." We should not just see the plague as God's punishment but as an occasion "to test our faith and love."



From the pen of Pastor Reed...

Before us are the hot and muggy months of summer. This is the time when school-age children relax and take it easy, and families take their vacations. And unfortunately, this is also the time of year when attendance and activities at church slow down.

But also, this is the time of year that the color of our altar paraments change to green, the color of growth!

Growth! Think of reseeding a lawn or trying to get grass to grow in those pesky, stubborn areas. After you prepare the ground and sow the seed you're not done. The seed needs watering. And perhaps like me, you can't wait for seed to sprout, take root, and grow taller and taller, and are pleased when it does!

Think of how pleased God is when the seed of His Word takes hold in our lives and grows! In fact, Jesus used this image when He spoke the Parable of the Sowing of the Seed (Matthew 13). He said the sown seed is the Word of God. But tragically, only seed actually produces a crop: 30, 60, or 100 times what was sown. Many seeds never take root. And for some of those, the resulting plants died. It is amazing how many seeds need to be sown in order to get something that looks like a lawn.

Plants thrive in hot weather— with plenty of sunshine and rain. Yet, much of this growth will pass by unnoticed, unless you happen to be the one who sowed the seed, or mows the lawn, or cares for the garden.

Dear Christian, Jesus has sown the seed of His Word into your heart. Praise God that this Word has taken root and you are blessed with the forgiveness of sins, life, eternal salvation, along with peace, hope, joy, and all the fruits of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23).

Still, God's not finished. It is time to grow in the true good works of faith. Peter wrote, "But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus" (2Peter 3:18).

Reflect on the important truths we find in Ephesians 2:8-10, which describe the relationship between God's grace, faith, and good works. "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them."



It's no coincidence that the church picked green for the color of her altar paraments following Pentecost. Plants thrive in the world around us this time of year. And at this time of the church year we consider how the Christian grows in grace and knowledge, bringing glory to God, and serving the neighbor with good works.

What is a good work? A good work is everything a child of God does, speaks or thinks in faith according to the Ten Commandments, for the glory of God and the benefit of his or her neighbor (Question 163 from "The Explanation of the Small Catechism," by Martin Luther, copyright 1991).

God is pleased when by His grace and Spirit, and in faith...

- we fear, love and trust in Him above all things;
- we call upon Him in every need, praise Him, pray to Him, and give Him thanks.;
- we hold His Word sacred, and gladly hear and learn it;
- we honor our parents and other authorities by serving and obeying, loving, and cherishing them;
- we help and support our neighbor in every physical need;
- we lead a sexually pure and decent life, and husbands and wives love and honor each other;
- we help our neighbor to improve and protect his possessions and income;
- we defend our neighbor, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way;
- and we are content with what God gives to us.

The things above are beyond our power to produce in our lives! No one would expect a plant to grow, thrive, and produce a crop without warm weather, sunlight, and water. And a believer shouldn't expect fruits like the ones above without the power of God's Spirit coming in and through God's Word and Sacraments.

This month, we will begin to come together as a church following three months of corona virus isolation. It will be wonderful seeing and greeting one another! Christian fellowship is a blessing of our Christian faith. But even more, we come together so our faith may be watered, that it nurtures and grows.

TECHNOLOGY ENDOWMENT FUND

Since the first of the year we have received \$4,047.46 for the Technology Endowment Fund. This is really good. The given-assets of this fund now stand at \$120,271.63. In 2019 we received \$5,787.56 in dividend income from this invested amount.

Technology is becoming one of the biggest expenses our church and school face. The camera we are using for the streaming broadcast was purchased from income from this fund. Much of the cost of our new telephone system came from this fund. If we continue streaming the added technology needed for this will come from this fund.

A gift of \$200.00 was given to this fund in memory of Sam Nelson. A gift of \$100.00 was received from Thrivent Choice Dollars. One couple gave \$100.00 from the stimulus money they received.

In the front of your packet there is a special envelope for this fund. It is marked Technology Endowment Fund (Future Needs). Every gift, no matter the size is appreciated.

In 2001 when we started the Technology Endowment Fund, this is what we wrote:

"It is our <u>DREAM</u> that Trinity will have the latest and the best in technology for the students, faculty and staff of Trinity School and the same for the pastors, staff and members of our congregation.

The Technology Endowment Fund is designed to provide income for computers, copiers, office equipment, televisions, DVD payers, software, and the Technology that has not yet been developed but will someday be available to help us in carrying on our ministries here at Trinity in fulfilling the Great Commission.

<u>SCHOOL ENDOWMENT FUND – FIFTY YEARS</u>

Health Topic - June 2020

June is headache and migraine awareness month. I hope the following information is useful.

The Common Headache: Ways to Stop the Pain

Almost everyone gets an occasional headache with its throbbing, pounding, vise-like sensation. The list of things that cause headaches is long. Migraine, cluster and sinus headaches are entities in themselves and often require medical intervention. They aren't "just in your head". However, the most common headache is usually caused by tension, and is the focus of this topic.

Ways to treat a tension headache

- Massage neck muscles, rubbing gently and firmly toward the heart. Massage temples in a gentle circular motion, beginning at the center and moving outward.
- · Apply a heating pad to the shoulders and neck or take a warm shower, letting the water massage the area.
- Lie down in a dark room with a cool cloth to the forehead.
- · Apply a cold pack against the forehead or neck.
- Take aspirin, acetaminophen, ibuprofen, or naproxen for pain, preferably before the pain becomes excruciating when the cycle is hard to break. Rate the pain on a scale of 1 to 10 with 10 being unbearable and 1 insignificant. Intervene at level 2-3 so that it never reaches level 5.
- Use relaxation techniques. Slow deep breathing with eyes closed or progressive relaxation techniques may also help prevent headaches when under stress.

Tips to prevent tension headaches

- Find ways to reduce stress in your life. Slow down and take five deep breaths. Daily set aside time to meditate.
- Make a conscious effort to relax the muscles of the jaw, neck and shoulders, even before there is a headache.
 Massage temples and neck frequently.
- Notice and correct neck and shoulder posture that results in strain.
- Get daily exercise, preferably outside.
- Reduce the amount of caffeine and sugar consumed in coffee, tea, and soft drinks.
- Avoid foods that seem to cause headaches.

Some common foods that may cause headaches in certain people

Hard cheeses Sour cream Red wine
Bananas Caffeine Citrus fruit
Chocolate Onions Nuts
Foods prepared with monosodium glutamate (MSG)

Migraines: How are they Different from the Common Headache

The American Migraine Foundation describes migraine as an inherited neurological disorder that is characterized by over excitability of specific areas of the brain. Physicians do not clearly understand what happens in the brain to start a migraine. What is clear, is that people with migraines are susceptible to transient factors called triggers that raise the risk of having a migraine attack. These triggers include hormonal fluctuations, environmental stimuli like weather or bright lights, certain smells, alcohol, certain foods, poor sleep, and high stress. However, not everyone has a clear trigger for migraine attacks. These are some of the symptoms of a migraine:

headache that is moderately or severely painful

headache pain gets worse with physical activity

headache pain that is throbbing and is often worse on one side

headache that causes you to miss school, work, or other activities

increased sensitivity to light, sound, or smells during a headache a long lasting headache 4 to 48 hours if untreated

If you have 2 or more of these symptoms the Migraine Foundation recommends that you talk to your health care provider about your headaches. Most treatments for migraines involve medications. One of the few treatments that doesn't involve medicine is gentle yoga that uses stretching postures that avoid adding strain to the neck and deep breathing.
